Prairie Smoke, Geum triflorum



I acquired three Prairie Smoke, native plants, a year or so ago and I love it in my garden. I had heard about this native gem from fellow Master Gardeners and it immediately became a "must have". Because of its size, it isn't a show stopper in the garden but does add interest especially as a border plant and can complement other more showy plants such as Stonecrop (Sedum), little bluestem (Schizachyrium scoparium), cornflower (Echinacea) and asters (Aster).

Its foliage forms a 10'-18" mound and spreads 6"-12" by underground rhizomes and eventually will produce a lovely groundcover. These fern-like semi evergreen leaves will turn a beautiful reddish, purplish colour at the end of the season.

It is not the leaves of this plant that it is known for but the flowers. Starting in the late spring, early summer Prairie Smoke sends out a 1' long flower stalk with clusters of reddish-pink to

maroon small flowers but there are several on each stem. Each floret resembles a closed bud which has 5 long pink sepals and 5 pink to white shorter petals. Once the flower has been pollinated, the style (female flower part) unfurls and elongate to form 3" silvery pink plumes that give the plant its name for these flower parts to remind the gardener of smoke in the wind. It certainly adds interest to the garden and lasts several weeks. Once these styles are dried, they can be used in dry flower arrangements.

It is a hardy plant surviving in zone 3-7 and tolerates almost any type of soil but doesn't perform well in wet conditions which can cause the rhizome to rot. Even though it will take a light shade, blooming is improved with better light. Once established in the garden, Prairie Smoke is mainly maintenance free. Keep them watered in the first year especially if it is a dry season. The leaves will extend into winter, leave them until spring clean-up.

After they are well established, the native plant can be divided to increase your numbers but be careful not to damage the rhizome which provides nutrients for the new divisions.

These beauties in nature are often found in undisturbed prairies that are dry open woods and rocky meadows. We find them in sparse grassy areas around the Great Lakes. Consider this gem for your garden. It is native so that alone makes it a good choice. You won't be disappointed.
