• **Pot up** your Christmas amaryllis. Bury the bottom 1/3 of the bulb in moist soil. You will be amazed how quickly your amaryllis wakes from dormancy

and begin to grow.

- **Reduce watering** of most indoor plants. 9 out of 10 problems with indoor plants are the result of over watering. Take a break.
- Order seeds for your veggie and flower garden. If you don't 'order' seeds, check out the fresh stock local hardware stores.
- Go to local horticultural club meetings. Gardeners are social creatures...
 especially in winter! Bring your questions and an inquisitive mind: many
 answers are to be found here!
- Read, listen, organize your garden photos from last summer and put up your gardening antennae: winter is when we learn and deepen our horticultural knowledge, not to mention create a plan for our 2023 garden!
- Order your seed catalogues or go online to view all of the new offerings. Our favourites include <u>Veseys</u> in P.E.I., <u>Ontario Seed</u> Company, McKenzie Seeds, and Stokes.
- Check indoor tropical plants for bugs. Squish them with your thumb or apply Green Earth insecticidal soap. If you have spider mites spray with room temperature water everyday and make sure that you reach the underside of the leaves.

BIRDS IN FOCUS: Sharing a Love of Birds By: Jody Allair

For the first time since the pandemic started I was able to get back to leading <u>birding tours</u> across Canada and spend time birding with others. In many ways it reinforced just how important it is that we share our love of birds with people. Many of us discovered the joy and value of birds during the pandemic. I managed to get this photo of an adult male back in May. If seeing one of these gems in person doesn't help connect you with the beauty and importance of nature, I'm not sure what will.
